NOTE FROM THE HEADMASTER

Making lists with goals for each day works for me. In my youth, I was dependent on my memory to allow time for me to accomplish what needed to be done. Experience has taught me the flaws in that strategy.

The sheer volume of the activities and the choices many of us face daily can be overwhelming. This is as true for many children as it is for us adults. St. Michael's extracurricular activities this fall include Lego League, soccer, field hockey, cross-country, flag football, band and service opportunities. Winter swimming, drama, basketball and lacrosse are just around the corner. Many of our students are also involved in scouting, youth groups and a significant number of sports teams away from St. Michael's.

When homework and test preparation are added to the mix, the time to get everything done is limited. Sleep deprivation and diminished performance at school may be the result.

2011 Food Factor Challenge

Can FIRST LEGO League teams improve the quality of our food by finding ways to prevent contamination? St. Michael's students are exploring the topic of food safety by examining the possible points of contamination our food encounters: exposure to insects and creatures, unsterile processing and transportation and unsanitary preparation and storage. Their challenge is to create a solution to an identified problem in the food product selected. The teams are building and programming a LEGO robot to accomplish *Food Factor* missions. St. Michael's is sponsoring three teams that will compete in the regional tournament on Saturday, November 19, at Maggie Walker Governor's School. The tournament is free and open to the public.

MIDDLE SCHOOL MATH FIELD DAY

The students participated in cooperative and competitive mathematics activities with students from approximately 40 middle schools in the Richmond area. They also participated in small group sessions where they played Battleship using their knowledge of the Cartesian plane, built a moon buggy and used Google Sketchup to explore geometric shapes. Of particular interest was the keynote speaker who spoke about the advanced mathematics used to design and produce video games. EIGHTH GRADE CAMPING TRIP

The eighth grade class spent September 13-14 in New Castle, Virginia, at Wilderness Adventure located in Jefferson National Park. The students also enjoyed various free time activities including canoeing, volleyball, fishing, horseshoes, soccer and field games.
